

### Work and War:

"But when Sanballat and Tobiah and the Arabs and the Ammonites and the Ashdodites heard that the repairing of the walls of Jerusalem was going forward and that the breaches were beginning to be closed, they were very angry. And they all plotted together to come and fight against Jerusalem and to cause confusion in it. And we prayed to our God and set a guard as a protection against them day and night. In Judah it was said, 'The strength of those who bear the burdens is failing. There is too much rubble. By ourselves we will not be able to rebuild the wall." .. And I looked and arose and said to the nobles and to the officials and to the rest of the people, 'Do not be afraid of them. Remember the Lord, who is great and awesome, and fight for your brothers, your sons, your daughters, your wives, and your homes.' ... And the leaders stood behind the whole house of Judah. who were building on the wall. Those who carried burdens were loaded in such a way that each labored on the work with one hand and held his weapon with the other." Nehemiah 4:7-10, 14, 17

What I've learned from Nehemiah;

Good work is God's work: God glorifying work ultimately produces flourishing for his people as they participate in the work he designed them to do. Conclusively, my Father has marked and called me to work in a way and for a purpose that glorifies him.

Acronym Alcove—CPE: Clinical Pastoral Education was conceived by Dr. Richard Cabot as a method of learning pastoral practice in a clinical setting under supervision. Today many supervisors emphasize the importance of pastoral relationships being formed through an integration of personal history, behavioral theory and method, and spiritual development.

Opposition: God's enemies target His good work for destruction (Nehemiah was doing God's work in rebuilding the wall). Parallelly, I Pray: Ps. 74:22 says "Arise, O God, continuously experience the enemy's opposition as I work because of and for his glory.

External opposition reveals itself through reproach, ridicule, and eventually violence (Nehemiah's enemies saw Jerusalem as vulnerable while it remained unwalled. They sought to exploit this and make themselves masters over it. When fortified, it would become formidable against

External opposition never operates in isolation. It always teams up with internal opposition. Internal opposition usually appears when I am tired, overwhelmed, and untrusting. I, like Judah, am tempted to give up (Judah said, "Let us even let it fall, for we are not able to go forward with it," Neh. 4:10).



God has called me to respond to opposition as Nehemiah did:

Observe: What is God doing in the world? How is his glory being manifested? How is the enemy scheming and seeking to undermine the Lord's work?

defend your cause; remember how the foolish scoff at you all the day!" God cares for his people and desires to be our defender, therefore, I need to give God all my cares, griefs, fears, and ask for divine protection. The Lord detests the abuse of his people; we should expect God to appear and fight against it.

Set Guards: Both prayer and vigilance must guard against opposition. If I pray without vigilance, I'm slothful and I tempt God. If I am vigilant without prayer, I'm proud and I slight God. Erring in either direction forfeits his protection. Matt. 26:41 states, "Watch and pray that you may not enter into temptation. The spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak."

Call to arms and perseverance in work: Girded with prayer and submitting to the Lord Jesus as the captain and commander of all the armies of heaven. I am now prepared to persevere in the work the Lord has called me to. Vigilance reminds me that the enemy never rests; I and my "family" must continually rally to and

fall in behind King Jesus. Remember the Lord, who is great and terrible; you think your enemies are great and terrible, but what are they in comparison with God, especially in opposition to him!? God's provision for my safety motivates me to press on with intensity in my duty. My enemies will drive me into the arms of the Lord and bolster the work of my hands.

May: Rich had the opportunity to attend a major chaplain training where all available chaplains in the Pacific Theater





- Pray for endurance as Rich continues to offer hope, a listening ear, strength, and truth in the midst of difficult circumstances.
- Pray that unhealthy personalities causing chaos in the CID unit changeover would be removed.
- Pray that God would bring more families and people to Wheeler chapel!
- Praise that we get to work with an amazing chaplain team at Wheeler—by name Alvin, Jeremiah, Joe, Luke, Pete, Rich
- Praise that Rich's Religious Affairs NCO had a successful transition back to the mainland and that he was promoted to Staff Sergeant!
- Spiritual warfare continues to rage. There are spiritual strongholds on the island due to native island religions and the influence of Asian religions. Pray that the Lord would shackle these rulers and principalities.
- Pray for God's continued provision for us as HI is a tremendously expensive place to live. Also pray that Jeanna would feel financially secure enough to pursue her master's degree (MBA in non-profit business).
